



Q: Why do bad things happen to good people? Does God cause bad things or does he just let them happen? Does he punish or discipline? And what could be the purpose—such as when you lose your Mom at the age of 11 and she suffered so with cancer?

A: We live in a world permeated with sin. It's a sinful world. Because of that and since the devil is the prince of this world, as the Bible says, bad things happen to good people. But consider this. A lot more good has happened to people who love God in Jesus than bad. Read Psalm 90 and 91. And consider how God can turn the bad things into good for those who love God (Romans 8:28).

God does no evil. Yes, He can cause and allow bad things to come to us, but always for our good. Scripture also gives witness to God punishing the wicked (Proverbs) and punishing individuals and even whole nations for evil (Egyptians, Israel for their wickedness and idolatry, etc.). But when it comes to sin, we Christians know that God has punished Jesus in our place for our sins, and that we are not punished. God disciplines those whom He loves. Read Hebrews 12.

We know God is Good and Gracious and Loving in giving us the Way, the Truth and the Life for our salvation, our Savior Jesus. We know that He works all things for our good. And that must be the purpose in your and your mother's case, although it may be a bitter pill to swallow. We must always turn to God in His Word and prayer for answers, never away from Him. Sometimes the answers He has are not evident right now, but later. It may even be in heaven that we see and understand His purposes.

Honor your mother

Anna Jarvis, the woman who first suggested a national day to honor mothers, had an incredible mother to honor. Her mom, Ann Reeves Jarvis (1832-1905), was a Sunday school teacher and activist who helped lower infant mortality rates in Appalachia and promoted friendship among families of Civil War soldiers.

At a memorial service for her mother, Anna Jarvis distributed carnations — her mom's favorite flower — to attendees. Her idea to set apart one day each year for moms gained traction, and in 1914, President Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May Mother's Day. It was customary by then to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living.

Of the white flowers, Jarvis said they "symbolize the truth, purity and broad-charity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too, mothers hug their children to their hearts, their mother love never dying."


Men's Bible Study:

ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN CHURCH VOTERS MEETING April 16, 2023 To be approved at the next Voters Meeting

President Scott Baker called the St. Peter's Lutheran Church voters meeting to order at 11:01am on Sunday, April 16, 2023.

Pastor Matthew Jennings opened the meeting with a prayer.

The roll call was answered by 44 members.

Bret Hauser made a motion to accept the consent agenda and reports. Bob Wulf seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Old Business:

Jean Ranabargar reported that all voters have received a copy of the constitution and by-laws with the changes that the district recommended. If anyone would like to have a printed copy, they need to contact Mary Bulk.

Jean said that all voters will receive a final copy of the constitution with the final additions and changes at least 30 days before the July meeting. A first vote to accept the changes will be taken at the July meeting. A second vote will be at the October meeting and after that meeting the constitution will go back to the district constitution committee for approval.

A question was raised about the building of the storage shed for the church. Darrell Krone said that he has asked for bids for a 25'X40' shed to give the committee an idea on how much to expect to pay for the building.

New Business:

After the discussion concerning the storage shed, Dave Scantlin told the voters that shingles are coming off of the roof of the church. He has asked Boren Roofing Company from Iola to come and look at the roof to get an idea of what needs to be replaced. He stated that he thought that on the west side of the roof on the north end is getting soft. He would like Boren Roofing Company to check that out also.

It was the consensus of the voters to repair or replace the roof of the church before the storage building to be built.

Alan Hauser addressed the retention of insurance policies. At the present time the church procedure is to keep all policies forever. Alan stated that LCMS is recommending that the rule be changed to keep the policies for 7 years.

Darrell Krone made the motion to change the policy from keeping the insurance policies forever to 7 years. Dave Scantlin seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Announcements:

Dave Scantlin has contacted a carpet cleaning service to look at the carpets for cleaning. He is asking people to look at items located in the Sunday School rooms, fellowship hall stage and under the bell tables to see if items could be cleared out so that when the carpet cleaning company comes to clean that it would be easier for them.

Curt Mueller thanked Don Lytle and Steve Bulk for mowing the church lawn.

THE 2nd 30 YEARS OF PROGRESS AT ST. PETER'S

(Information taken from the 75th Anniversary Celebration booklet dated June 12, 1938)

- **1894.** Future elections the first meeting of the year. Henry Gerken elected permanent chairman at this meeting. Pastor to serve Humboldt and Owl Creek every Sunday, alternating morning an afternoon service. Discuss a new church building and at an extra meeting December 16 committee of five elected to draw up plans.
- **1895.** Church 36x56x18 is planned. Pledged \$640.00 to be paid by October 1. Building committee discharged one month later.
- **1896.** Needy in Oklahoma sent \$11, 720 pounds flour and 40 pounds clothing. J.W. Nessel begins long term as treasurer following eleven years as secretary.
- **1897.** Most of business devoted to discussion of financial matters.
- **1898.** Mission festival with German service in morning and English in afternoon.
- **1899.** Gas used as fuel in church at one dollar a month.
- **1900.** Decide to use full time pastor. Support is asked of everyone, including young people. Kauffeld receives call from Marshall county, Kansas, as is released because he was not well and at that place he would not need to teach school.
- **1901.** Four meetings to call pastor. No results.
- **1902.** Meetings on February 16, March 16, April 5, April 12, April 18, May 17, June 22, when, with the aid of professors at St. Louis Seminary, J.W. Werling is sent to Humboldt and installed August 31, 1902, as pastor.
- 1903. New church building comes up again. H. Heitlage and J. Geissler to get pledges for church building. Vote to build church brick veneer church 36x56x16 with steeple 60 feet high and figure cost. Martin Sauer, John Igel and John Gadarl elected building committee. Contract let to J.W. Nessel for \$3200. Half of pledges to be paid by June 11. Front of old church removed to first window but not until after the confirmation exercises. Specify that steeple of new building should have a cross. Woodwork of new church to be colonial yellow. Furnace purchased for \$148. Prof. Meier, Pastor Hanson, Pastor Lange invited to conduct dedication service.
- **1904.** Total cost of church \$3503.23 of which \$2265 was collected from members and \$387 from other sources, leaving a debt of \$826.23.
- **1905.** Pastor allowed to preach three English services in following quarter. Resolution to have English once month. Later English morning service abolished. Two hundred dollars and interest paid on church debt.
- **1907.** Paid off \$448.85 on church debt.
- **1908.** Church debt reported paid. Beginning July 1, pastor's salary raised from \$400 to \$500 a year. Resolution that whenever money is needed for anything a collection should be taken.
- **1909.** Mrs. Sickman elected janitor. A new barn is built and paid for. Werling receives call from Winfield and is refused release.

- **1910.** Two months later Werling is released. Call sent to W.T. Vogel, Dewey, Ill. Returns call. Calls sent to four other pastors and finally another call is sent to Vogel June 19 which he accepts. Pastor permitted to preach English every Sunday evening. Decide to build parsonage in fall. Rent Fisher house until parsonage completed.
- **1911.** Parsonage completed at cost of \$1753.74, Debt of \$760. Clara Nessel elected organist.
- **1912.** Celebrate fifty-year jubilee. Prof. Grabner and Prof. Werling invited.
- **1913.** Pastor's salary raised to \$600 a year effective July 1.
- **1914.** Hire student to teach school eight month period. Pay raised by subscription.
- **1915.** H.H. Gerken elected chairman for life. Hire teacher again. Balance on parsonage paid. Lightning strikes steeple. Repaired at cost of \$172.
- **1916.** Pastor's salary raised to \$800 a year.
- 1918. Church buys \$210 liberty bonds. Pastor received call from Collinsville, Illinois and asked to leave. Sudden shock to congregation, but is released. Three calls sent, the last to P.C. Kraus of Joplin, Missouri on August 11. He accepts pastorate on second call. Kraus arrived in Humboldt October 6, 1918, and was installed, but did not preach his first sermon until five weeks later because of influenza quarantine. Resolution that all teaching be in English language.
- **1919.** Hire student at \$50 a month. Resolution to pay teacher and pastor out of regular congregational treasury. Committee of three to see that money is collected. Pastor's salary raised from \$800 to \$1000m effective January 1, 1920.
- **1920.** Decide not to hire student teacher. Too few children. Art glass windows purchased.
- **1921.** Drop school again for lack of support.
- **1922.** Those unable to express themselves in German allowed to express themselves in English at meetings. Morning service to be conducted in English on last Sunday of each month.
- **1923.** Resolution to have school once more providing there are children enough. Dropped at next meeting. Motion to have English services every other Sunday tabled. Gas radiators installed. Resolution to build new school house.
- 1924. J.W. Nessel asks that after thirty years service as treasurer, he be relieved of said office. H.C. Gerken elected, but refused to serve on account of his being inconveniently located. Unanimously voted to use English language in all business meetings. Committee on school building report no action, lack of information. Envelope system with monthly payments adopted. Heating system cost \$1117. Paid by subscription. Constitution revised and printed in English language. Finance committee provided for. Building of school deferred a year. Pastor's salary raised to \$1200, back pay to January 1, 1924. German and English service to alternate.
